

Dear Parents and Carers,

We have written this brochure to provide you with information about our school that will help answer some of the questions you may have. We are known as the 'gem in the park', to the local community, Sparhawk Infant and Nursery School is a Community School for children between the ages of 3 and 7 years. We are located in Sparhawk Avenue next to the attractive local public park. Opened in September 1977 the spacious building is a 2 form entry school with a nursery (opened in 1997). Each class is named after a gem.





All classrooms have

integral cloakroom and toilet areas. There is a large hall which is used for assemblies, school meals, PE and music lessons. There is also a spacious library area. The school has a fully fitted kitchen which provides us with our school lunches.



The school has attractive, safe and secure grounds. This includes a Foundation Stage garden with large and small play apparatus. In main school the children have their own garden areas to grow vegetables and flowers, a wildlife area, climbing equipment, pirate ship, music zone, water area and an outside classroom canopy. Our wonderful friends association (FOSSA - Friends of Sparhawk School Association) and local businesses continue to support improvements. Our School Council and the children in the school have led fundraising projects which also enhances our provision. Our community are proud of their school.

Admissions Policy

Parents are required to choose their preferred choice of school and send this to the Local Authority in the year before their child starts school. Sparhawk Infant and Nursery School does not decide who does or who does not get a place as this is organised by the Local Authority.

Nursery School

We are a Local Authority maintained nursery. Children are able to start nursery school from their third birthday. Funded places are available the term after their third birthday. Please see website for more details http://www.sprowstonsparhawk.norfolk.sch.uk/

Infant School

The Local Authority admissions policy, which the school is obliged to follow, states:

Children are able to start infant school in the academic year (September to August) in which they have their fifth birthday.

All children will be offered full time education after the induction period. Parents and carers of children whose birthday falls between March and August can opt for part time education (mornings only) for the autumn term.

SPARHAWK SCHOOL

The year before children start in reception we hold several 'Open Days'. This is an opportunity for prospective parents and carers to find out about our school and ask us lots of questions! Details will be sent to nursery and reception intake for the relevant year.

In the term before children start school there is a meeting for reception parents with the Head and Foundation Stage staff.

Children are able to attend school for an introductory session during the term before they are due to start.

Our teachers value liaising with our early years' colleagues in other settings. Please let us and your child's pre-school know that your child is coming to Sparhawk School. It will be very helpful for your child's transition.

Ofsted Inspection

We had our last Ofsted Inspection in November 2019 where we were judged to be an Outstanding School based on the new Ofsted Framework.

This is an exceptional achievement that we are all immensely proud of. We were just the second school in the East of England to be judged outstanding under the new September 2019 framework. 'Pupils thrive at this school' is the opening line of the report.

We are delighted that we have received the recognition that we provide our children, from Nursery to Year 2, with an outstanding curriculum which allows each and every child to develop into a well-rounded individual. Sparhawk's Curriculum

We believe in providing pupils with a wide variety of learning experiences and that they should be engaged in a great deal of active learning. In this way they have opportunities to ask questions, investigate practical problems and take increasing responsibility for what they do. As a result children should develop knowledge and understanding of the area being explored, and competence in ways of finding out about things.

Much importance is placed on communication - reading, writing, speaking and listening. Through fruitful discussion children are able to make decisions about their work and behaviour.

At Sparhawk Infant and Nursery School we provide a broad creative curriculum for our children. When children first enter nursery and reception classes, they are provided with a curriculum for the Foundation Stage. By Year 1 children are working on the Key Stage 1 National Curriculum. During the summer term all Year 1 children undertake a National Phonics test called the Phonics Screening Check. Year 2 children continue to work on Key Stage 1 objectives, with statutory teacher assessments and optional SAT's (Government tests) taking place in the summer term.

Sparhawk has our very own progressive curriculum (see website for more details) that is firmly based on our school vision-discover, achieve and shine - in all areas of the curriculum and beyond from Nursery to year 2. We follow the National Curriculum Running through the heart of our curriculum is the child. Underpinning our progressive curriculum we have Sparhawk's values) and Sparhawk's skills for learning (represented through coloured gems).



Sparhawk's Skills for learning- These skills


are critical for any child to achieve in education and beyond. We aim to provide a classroom environment where independence, thinking skills, collaboration and active learning are developed at the same time as the curriculum knowledge is acquired. We aim to equip the children with skills that will enable them to be lifelong learners. Sparhawk's skills for learning are taught explicitly and each skill is represented by a coloured crystal ball.

Reading

It is our aim that every child should enjoy books and develop a lifelong enthusiasm for reading. Our home/school reading partnership is extremely important in supporting your child to read. Parents and Carers who work with us by regularly reading with their children will ensure that their child will continue to make good progress.

Reading is taught through a variety of methods with a high emphasis on phonics and the school is very well resourced with library books, group readers and language games.

Children are encouraged to take home their reading books on a daily basis.

A home/school record book accompanies the reading books and parents/carers and teachers record children's progress by writing comments in this book. This feedback is very useful. Children have access to a wide variety of other books and a wide range of reading material to ensure that they have a wide breadth of reading experience - not just from the book listed in their home-school reading book.

Our school library houses a comprehensive, wide range of appropriate fiction and non-fiction books and each class has its own selection of books to look at and read. Every class has a weekly library time where they can select a book to take home and share with their family and friends.

Writing

Importance is placed both on the process of writing and on the written product. As their skills develop, children are supported to write clearly and imaginatively in different situations, for a variety of audiences, across the curriculum.

Grammar, spelling, handwriting, descriptive writing, reporting, writing for a specific audience, creative writing and poetry are all included in the curriculum.

Mathematics

Maths is about numbers and counting, adding, subtracting, multiplying and dividing. It is also about shape, space, measuring, handling data and using mathematical skills in different situations. The school follows the National Curriculum.

Class teams' work together to plan maths' lessons using the key aims of the National Curriculum to ensure that all pupils become

- fluent in the fundamentals of mathematics, including through varied and frequent practice with increasingly complex problems over time
- 2. **reason mathematically** by following a line of enquiry and making generalisations using mathematical language
- 3. **solve problems** by applying their mathematics to a variety of routine and non routine problems with increasing sophistication.



We provide Religious Education in accordance with the 1988 Education Reform Act and the Norfolk Agreed Syllabus. We learn about religions and we learn from religions.





We aim to raise the children's awareness of the six major world faiths - Christianity, Judaism, Hinduism, Islam, Sikhism and Buddhism - exploring similarities and differences. We take the opportunity to provide the children with first hand experiences where relevant and appropriate.

Sex Education

At Sparhawk Infant and Nursery School we believe that sex education should be appropriate to the age and stage of development of the children and dependent on their readiness to receive information. Teaching opportunities will be found across the whole curriculum e.g. through stories, assemblies and class discussion. Children will be helped to understand and use appropriate and acceptable behaviours, develop the language skills necessary to understand and communicate their feelings, respect their own bodies and those of others. Their questions will be answered honestly and appropriately, with regard to setting, context and the children's age and understanding. Please speak to staff if you have any questions.

Physical Education

All children will receive a broad and balanced programme of PE. We aim to ensure that all children adopt healthy lifestyles and this is promoted through our PE curriculum. At Sparhawk we follow the scheme Get Set 4 PE in our lessons.

Educational Visits and Visitors to School

There are occasions during the year when children are taken out of school for educational visits linked with their school work. We try to use our local environment as much as possible. Full details are sent home before each visit.

Visits to join other schools for joint activities are sometimes made or other schools may visit ours.

Before each trip risk assessments will be carried out in accordance with National and Local Authority Regulations and the School's policy. Our Educational Visits Co-ordinator is Mrs Clare Campbell.

We invite people from different occupations, cultures and experiences to come to school to talk about their subjects and give the children a wider insight to our world. These shared experiences are appreciated and supervised by our members of staff.











Building links with parents

We are particularly proud here at Sparhawk with the relationships we build up with families. We regard our partnership with you and your involvement in your child's education as vital. Parental support for the school is highly valued. If at any time you feel concerned for your child over any point, no matter how small, or you need something clarified, please contact your child's teacher or the Head. Naturally, it is easier for the school if you can make an appointment when you wish to speak to staff for longer than a few minutes.

- We open our doors at 8:25am, the register is done at 8:40am.
- We have an open-door policy. Teachers are available most days at 3pm for a discussion about your child.
- Each class provides a newsletter weekly, this keeps you up to date with what your child has been learning, homework and

Friends of Sparhawk School Association (FOSSA)

All parents/carers automatically become members when their child starts school. FOSSA organise a variety of fundraising events and activities throughout the year. All monies raised are used directly to provide activities and equipment for our children to enjoy. All parents/carers are welcome at FOSSA meetings and we hope that as many people as possible will feel able to become active members.

Keeping your child safe at Sparhawk

Keeping our children safe is our biggest responsibility and we work hard to ensure children are, and feel, safe and secure at school. This commitment is known as 'safeguarding'.

We can keep children safe by keeping the building safe and well maintained and ensuring children behave in a safe way at school. Making sure that all adults in school have been police checked (DBS) is another way we keep children safe in school. We are required to listen to children if they have concerns about their safety and we have a duty to act upon anything a child says which may suggest they are at risk or are unsafe. We have 4 Designated Safeguarding people.

Whenever possible, we will share any concerns we may have before taking action, however we are legally required to pass on concerns we have about children to the Local Authority. The school's Safeguarding and Child Protection Policy is available to parents on request.

Medical Care

Unfortunately we cannot take responsibility for giving any short term medication to a child such as Calpol. However, if your child has been prescribed medication, but is well enough to be in school, then we are able to administer this at school. Please go to the school office to complete a form. If your child needs regular long-term medication then a health care plan will need to be completed which will be supported by your medical practitioner.

Accidents or Illness in School

It is important that we should have parent's daytime telephone numbers and an alternative person to contact in case a child is taken ill or has an accident whilst at school. Please remember to tell the school if any of your telephone numbers change.

In case of emergency the Headteacher will try her best to contact parents/carers concerned but if this is not possible, she will act on the advice of the Medical Officer consulted.

Absence

When a child is absent from school the reason for that absence is required by law. Please contact school by 9:00 a.m. on the first day of absence by telephone on 01603 406406. We have to record a reason for every absence in the class register and provide numbers to the Government. Latest attendance data to date shows the school attendance rate was 95.39%. There were no unexplained absences.

From 1 September 2013 a change in the law means that schools are not allowed to authorise family holidays. Schools are only allowed to authorise absence under exceptional circumstances; examples may include family bereavements / funerals or armed personnel or services staff returned from extended duties away from home. Please speak to the headteacher if you have further questions.

Behaviour

At Sparhawk we use a positive approach to behaviour management (Emotion Coaching)which focuses on the expected behaviour of a child rather than the negative. If a child is experiencing a difficulty we discuss it with the child and offer them a productive way of resolving the issue. Our curriculum supports this process and we are proud of our caring ethos. We deal with in-school issues and only discuss a child's behaviour either by prior agreement or if it is exceptional. If you are concerned that your child is finding peer relationships difficult please do not hesitate to come in and talk to us.

Safety

At Sparhawk Infant and Nursery School we are concerned for the safety and well-being of everyone who enters the school, especially the children. During the school day all visitors report to the Main Entrance.

The front door of the school has a security lock monitored and controlled by the school office. Other external doors are fitted with security handles and digital locks, which prevent them from being opened from the outside. All gates, except the visitors' entrance gate, are locked after the beginning of the school day and unlocked before the end of school.

School Entrances and Parking

There are two entrances on Sparhawk Avenue but the second is accessed through Sparhawk Park. For the safety of your children PLEASE DO NOT park in the staff car park or use it to drop off or collect children. We also request that you respect our neighbours and park only on the <u>school side</u> of Sparhawk Avenue away from the zig-zag lines. Please help us to reduce congestion and ensure safety by parking two or three minutes' walk away from the school.

School Uniform

Our school colours are red, white and grey or black.

Embroidered school uniform is provided by Stevenson's (<u>www.stevensons.co.uk</u>) and you can order online by phone or in store, however this is not a requirement.

Children come to school to learn and have fun and this is best achieved if children are dressed smart and comfortably. Please consider the list below when purchasing school uniform.

School Meals

As part of a Government initiative in 2014 all infant aged pupils are entitled to receive a free hot meal every day and a cup of milk. Meal choices are made through our ordering App Pupil Asset. Hot school meals are cooked by our County Catering provider (Norse) based at Sparhawk in our newly refurbished kitchen and eaten in our school hall. A main course and dessert is served. Alternatives are available (see school website for an up to date menu). Wherever possible Norse uses fresh fruit and vegetables and meat from local suppliers. We aim to provide our children with a healthy diet.

Packed Lunches

If you do not wish your child to have a school meal, then he/she may bring a packed lunch to school. If you provide your child with a drink would you please make sure that it is not fizzy and that it is in a leak-proof container inside the lunch-box. Water is provided for all children on their lunch tables. Please make sure that the packed lunch you provide is a healthy one and does not contain sweets, chocolate etc.

We are also a NUT FREE school so please check lunch boxes

Mid-Morning Drinks and Snacks

The school is part of the Government's free fruit initiative and every child is offered a piece of fruit at break time each day. Children may also bring their own piece of fruit, carrot or celery etc to eat at morning break if they wish. These should be named so that they can't get muddled with another child's snack.

Children who are under 5 years old can have free milk each day with their snack. The rest of the school are offered milk as part of their lunchtime meal.

As a healthy school we feel it is important that your child regularly drinks water. Please send your child in with a named spill proof bottle containing water ONLY. Children are encouraged to drink from these bottles throughout the day.

Our Approach to Teaching Learners with SEN

At Sparhawk Infant and Nursery School we believe in participation for all. We want all adults and children to participate in learning and we celebrate all members of our community. We want to create an inclusive culture in our school and we aim to be responsive to the diversity of children's backgrounds, interests, experience, knowledge and skills.

We value high quality teaching for all learners and actively monitor teaching and learning in the school.

We aim to create a learning environment which is flexible enough to meet the needs of all members of our school community. We monitor progress of all learners, and staff continually assess, ensuring that learning is taking place. Our whole school system for monitoring progress includes regular pupil progress meetings, where discussions on individual pupil progress are held between the class teacher, the Head Teacher, and SENCO.



The school has a Special Educational Needs and Disability (SEND) policy, which is linked to the Code of Practice for Special Educational Needs and has been developed as part of our cluster of schools.

Children with Special Educational Needs will have a one page profile developed for them which is designed for their particular need. These needs will be discussed and reviewed regularly with parents/carers and targets set as part of the plan.

Children who speak English as an additional language

If a child needs help improving their English because it is their second language, we are able to give extra support.

Equal Opportunities

All members of the school's community are treated with equal regard and we aim to offer equal opportunities in learning, regardless of intellect, age, gender, physical ability, capability, characteristics, racial or ethnic group, religious beliefs or social background. We do not tolerate any discrimination at our school.

School Council

The children vote in members of the School Council. Elections are held at the start of the school year. School Council meet regularly to make decisions about charities we will support, events and equipment.



Transfer to Junior School

At the end of nursery (4 years of age) our nursery children move into either one of our Reception classes: Topaz or Sapphire. Please speak to the Early Years team if you have any worries about this stage of transition for your child.

At the end of Year 2 (7 years of age) our children transfer to junior school and most of our children usually go to Falcon Junior School or White Woman Lane Junior School. Reception and junior school places are allocated to you by Children's Services at Norfolk County Council.
